

**SUMMARY OF MINISTERIAL ACCOUNTABILITY FOR OPERATING EXPENSES**  
(for the Fiscal Year Ending March 31, 2009)  
(\$000)

Under section 3 of the Balanced Budget and Ministerial Accountability Act (BBMAA), each member of the Executive Council has 20 per cent of his or her salary held back with restoration of half of the holdback contingent on government achieving its overall fiscal target for the year as per section 4, and restoration of the other half of the holdback contingent on ministers achieving individual goals as set out in section 5. For each minister with responsibility for operating expenses accounted for in the Consolidated Revenue Fund (other than the Minister of Small Business and Revenue), section 5(1) stipulates actual results for the year must not exceed the estimated amounts for that fiscal year. Section 5(2) applies to the Minister of Small Business and Revenue and requires the minister to achieve an amount of revenue to be specified by regulation of Treasury Board. Section 5(3) applies to ministers of state, for whom expected results are specified by Treasury Board regulation.

Section 6(1) of BBMAA requires that the estimated amounts of operating expenses which are the responsibility of the minister must be made public with the main estimates each fiscal year. These amounts are permitted to be adjusted pursuant to section 6(1.1) in the event of a government reorganization. The schedule below shows the effect of the recent government reorganization on the estimated amounts of ministers with responsibility for operating expenses as described in section 5(1). While the reorganization renamed a number of ministries and created one new ministry, the appropriations in the *2008/09 Estimates* remain unchanged. The orders in council transferring responsibilities and spending authority do not create new appropriations, but rather provide authority to individual ministers to spend from the appropriations that relate to their assigned responsibilities, even though those appropriations may have previously been the responsibility of another minister. Other ministers may also have authority to spend from those same appropriations for purposes that relate to their assigned responsibilities.

In the table below, the column entitled "Minister Responsible" lists the ministers with their assigned responsibilities after the reorganization. The column entitled "Appropriations in 2008/09 Estimates" shows the appropriations from the 2008/09 main estimates for which those ministers are now responsible. The columns entitled "Appropriation Operating Expenses (net)" and "2008/09 Estimated Amount" show the dollar amounts of operating expenses (net) and estimated amounts attributed to ministers in the *2008/09 Estimates*. The column entitled "Order In Council Adjustments" shows transfers of spending authority resulting from orders in council implementing the government reorganisation in 2008. The final two columns show the reallocated appropriations (or portions thereof) for which individual ministers are now responsible and the revised estimated amounts for each minister.

1 Reflects reallocation of StudentAid BC loan management to the Minister of Small Business and Revenue and responsibility for research and innovation policy (including the Science and Technology Fund and the Premier's Technology Council) to the Minister of Technology, Trade and Economic Development.

2 Reflects reallocation of immigration policy and programs to the Minister of Advanced Education and Labour Market Development; and support services for gaming policy and enforcement and liquor control and licensing to the Minister of Housing and Social Development.

3 Reflects reallocation of responsibility for community living services to the Minister of Housing and Social Development

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- 4 Reflects reallocation of the Bladerunners program, responsibility for mentoring women entering and re-entering the workforce, and the BC Public Service Agency to the Minister of Advanced Education and Labour Market Development; services to seniors and women (except community transition programs) to the Minister of Health Living and Sport; and women's community transition services to the Minister of Housing and Social Development.
- 5 Reflects reallocation of responsibility for the Innovative Clean Energy Fund to the Minister of Technology, Trade and Economic Development.
- 6 The Ministers of Forests and Range and Environment each have operating expense accountability for the administration and support services of the Environmental Appeal Board and Forest Appeals Commission; therefore, those funds have been allocated appropriately.
- 7 Reflects reallocation of air and water quality monitoring and reporting to the Minister of Healthy Living and Sport.
- 8 Reflects reallocation of the Public Sector Employers' Council Secretariat and the Employer Association to the Minister of Advanced Education and Labour Market Development.
- 9 Under Section 5(1.1) of the *Balanced Budget and Ministerial Accountability Act*, the estimated amount for the Minister of Forests and Range does not include estimated expenditures related to the BC Timber Sales Special Account.
- 10 Reflects reallocation of responsibility for housing and homelessness policy to the Minister of Housing and Social Development; and responsibility for mountain pine beetle emergency community response to the Minister of Community Development.
- 11 Reflects reallocation of responsibility for aboriginal health promotion, population health and wellness (including drinking water protection, food safety, milk industry monitoring, and tobacco control), and emergency health management to the Minister of Healthy Living and Sport.
- 12 Reflects reallocation of the Child in the Home of a Relative program to the Minister of Children and Family Development.
- 13 Reflects reallocation of the Capital Planning Secretariat to the Minister of Finance.
- 14 Reflects reallocation of gaming policy and enforcement and liquor control and licensing to the Minister of Housing and Social Development.
- 15 Reflects reallocation of responsibility for labour market policy, planning and strategy (including the Provincial Nominee Program, WorkBC, Skills Connect Qualification Program and Industry Training Authority) to the Minister of Advanced Education and Labour Market Development; responsibility for regional economic growth and diversification, the Northern Development Fund, and the Columbia Basin Accord to the Minister of Community Development; responsibility for the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Games Secretariat to the Minister of Finance; and regional infrastructure programs to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure.
- 16 Reflects reallocation of sport and recreation programs (including ActNowBC) to the Minister of Healthy Living and Sport; and volunteer programs to the Minister of Housing and Social Development.
- 17 Under Section 5(2) of the *Balanced Budget and Ministerial Accountability Act*, the Minister of Small Business and Revenue is accountable for earning actual gross revenue specified by regulation of Treasury Board.
