## ***1. Corporate Profile***

The BC Heritage Trust is a Crown corporation, reporting in the 2000/2001 fiscal year to the Minister of Small Business, Tourism and Culture.

The *Heritage Conservation Act* establishes the Heritage Trust as an agent of the government. The objects of the Trust as expressed in Section 25 of the *Act* are:

- (a) to conserve and support the conservation of heritage sites and heritage objects;
- (b) to gain further knowledge about British Columbia's heritage;
- (c) to increase public awareness, understanding and appreciation of British Columbia's heritage;
- (d) to undertake such other activities related to British Columbia's heritage as the Minister may authorize.

To advance its mandate, the Trust provides financial assistance to local governments and various organizations to undertake heritage-related projects, enters partnerships and undertakes its own special initiatives. Awareness of heritage conservation and participation in projects is actively promoted. Local governments and Band Councils may apply for assistance, as well as post-secondary institutions, religious and heritage organizations in British Columbia, non-profit organizations and societies

registered in the province, and individuals applying for scholarships or study grants.

The Board of the Heritage Trust is appointed by Order-in-Council. Its members are broadly representative of the regions of the Province and have heritage expertise, skills and interests that contribute to the work of the Trust.

The mission of the Trust, as approved by the Board, is:

*To encourage and facilitate sustained conservation, public access, awareness and appreciation for British Columbia's heritage as expressed through its properties, sites, communities, cultural activities and organizations.*

## 2. *Message from the Chair*

The past year the BC Heritage Trust was engaged in advancement of long-standing goals, the process of renewal and refocus of efforts. The Trust continued to *support heritage planning, conservation and interpretation* in British Columbia, and:

- awarded 87 grants totalling \$745,751 for community heritage capital, development and management projects, scholarships and student prizes, and provincial non-profit heritage organizations;
- communicated to government the need to increase investment in community and provincial heritage properties;
- supported conservation of heritage values of Steveston Cannery Row.

The Board continued to *inform the public about the value of heritage*, and:

- implemented the BC Heritage Websites Program, in partnership with Industry Canada, Ministry of Education and the BC Museums Association;
- began to contribute “BC Heritage Trust” columns to newsletters of provincial non-profit heritage organizations, to improve communications with the heritage community;
- supported six regional Heritage Fairs, involving student heritage projects that reflect their personal appreciation of heritage;

- promoted “Heritage Week 2001” to celebrate the province’s diverse transportation heritage, and recognized the 2001 BC Heritage Award recipient, Garry Anderson of Cranbrook.

In our *search for new directions* to revitalize the Trust, we explored numerous issues and opportunities, and developed a new vision for our future. We recommended the Minister consider a more autonomous Crown Corporation status with enhanced responsibilities and requisite funding. The Trust pursued the goal of increasing independence as it believes significant cultural, economic and environmental benefits would ensue.

The Board worked closely and enthusiastically with the Heritage Branch and Heritage Society of BC to advance heritage conservation in British Columbia. Partnerships with other organizations will be essential to pursue priorities for future years identified in the Trust’s Performance Plan, 2001-2004.

We remain committed to our mission:

*To encourage and facilitate sustained conservation, public access, appreciation and awareness of British Columbia’s heritage as expressed through its properties, sites, communities, cultural activities and organizations.*

### 3. Report on Performance Plan

In the Spring of 2001, the Heritage Trust prepared a Performance Plan pursuant to the requirements of the *Budget Transparency and Accountability Act*. This document, covering the period 2001 to 2004, was presented to the Clerk of the House in April 2001.

The Performance Plan stated the Trust's values:

- Respect for the authenticity and integrity of our irreplaceable heritage resources.
- Respect for cultural diversity and the need to tell the complete story of our Province's history.
- Respect for local authorities that are enabled through legislation to conserve and protect community heritage.
- Promotion of good stewardship of heritage resources.
- Responsiveness to community heritage initiatives.
- Prudent use of public funds: transparency and accountability in project adjudication, attracting community and private investment, leaving a valuable heritage legacy.

In addition, the Performance Plan identified key trends, opportunities and challenges facing the Trust:

#### Trends

- More rehabilitation of the existing built environment and use of core urban areas and older neighbourhoods.
- Increasing numbers of individuals with time and interest to participate in heritage-related activities.
- More individuals seeking personal investments that leave a meaningful community legacy.
- Greater cultural diversity, creating demand for new interpretations of our history and heritage.
- Increasingly sophisticated technology
- Declining annual Trust budget (\$4.1 million in fiscal year 1991/92; \$1.4 million in 2000/01).
- Continuing community needs and requests for funding support.
- Staffing limitations increasingly challenging the Trust's ability to carry out core responsibilities.

#### Key Opportunities

- Communities are interested in partnerships to capitalize on heritage resources that support tourism and downtown revitalization.
- Trust investments in heritage rehabilitation contribute significantly to the evolution of the "green economy".

- The Trust's involvement in community heritage projects attracts, on average, three additional dollars of investment.
- The Trust could fulfil an increasing role as advocate and champion for conservation of the heritage and history of British Columbia.

The recently completed Performance Plan also established the Trust's business/program areas and goals, its objectives and strategies, and performance measures for the period 2001/2002 through 2003/2004. These are referred to in part 7 of this Annual Report.

### **Key Challenges**

- Heritage resources continue to be threatened by development pressures and neglect.
  - Current annual provincial funding for the Trust's *Community Heritage Investment Program* represents a commitment of only 18 cents per capita.
  - Erosion in heritage expertise compromises the capacity to deliver existing programs and implement effective new initiatives.
  - There is no Provincial Heritage Policy to provide formal expression of the government's commitment to conserve the Province's heritage.
  - Only approximately one third of local governments have a Community Heritage Commission or any form of heritage policy or program.
  - The ability to secure corporate or other private sector support for heritage conservation is constrained by competition from well-organized fund-raising activities by hospital, universities, schools and other non-profit institutions.

## 4. *Financial Report*

### *Report of Management*

The Heritage Trust receives an annual allocation through the voted funds of the Ministry of Small Business, Tourism and Culture. This allocation is currently \$750,000 and is provided to fund the Community Heritage Investment Program of the Trust.

In addition, in 2000/2001, the Trust received a supplementary allocation of \$75,000 to offset extraordinary research and planning costs incurred in the Trust's review of its role and activities and in development of a proposal for an enhanced mandate.

No allocation is provided to cover administrative costs or to enable the Trust to undertake other initiatives within its legislative mandate. At the present time, these other costs are covered through interest earned on invested funds, the amounts recovered from rescinded project grants, funds secured from other partners, and any uncommitted carryover at the end of the fiscal year.

Although established as a Crown corporation with a separate Board reporting to the Minister of Small Business, Tourism and Culture, the Heritage Trust has no employees. Personnel of the Heritage Branch or other employees of the Ministry or the Province provide all support services to the Trust, with the exception of annual contracts for book-keeping and audit services, and occasional contracts for special initiatives.

Services provided by the Heritage Branch for Board support, research and policy development, management, program administration, communications and promotion, financial services and general administration had a value in excess of five person years in 2000/2001. When other expenditures related to space, systems and supplies are added, the Trust received about \$391,000 in support from the Branch. These funds are not included in the Trust's annual budget, but are reported as a supplementary note to its audited financial statements.

The following section contains the Auditor's Report and the Financial Statements for the period ended March 31, 2001.

## Notes to the Financial Statements

### 1. Description of the Trust

The British Columbia Heritage Trust is a crown corporation, established under the Heritage Conservation Act, which commenced operations on March 10, 1978. The purpose of the Trust is to encourage and facilitate the protection and conservation of heritage property in British Columbia. Approximately 78% of 2000/01 revenue was received by way of grants from the Province of British Columbia.

### 2. Summary of significant accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and include the following significant accounting policies:

#### **Investment funds**

The investment funds consist of units in Province of British Columbia Pooled Investment Portfolios and are recorded at the lower of cost and market value.

#### **Grants**

##### *Revenue*

Grants to the Trust are accounted for using the deferral method.

##### *Expenditures*

Grants to approved projects are recorded as an expenditure in the year the disbursement is made.

---

### 3. Financial instruments

The carrying amounts of the Trust's financial assets and liabilities approximate their fair value.

---

### 4. Related party transactions

During the year, the Trust had the following transactions with the Province of British Columbia:

- (a) Received grant revenue of \$825,000 (2000: \$750,000).
  - (b) Received certain staffing, accommodation and administrative services at no charge. The fair value of providing these services amounted to approximately \$391,000 (2000: \$301,000).
  - (c) Earned income from its funds invested in the Pooled Investment Portfolio amounting to \$68,920 (2000: \$64,656). In addition, the Trust paid the British Columbia Investment Management Corporation \$4,725 (2000: \$2,383) for management of the Portfolio.

## ***5. Statement of Corporate Governance Practices***

### ***5.1 Board Duties and Objectives***

The Board of Directors guides the activities of the Trust by development of policy relating to initiatives within the mandate of the Trust, as outlined in Section 25 of the *Heritage Conservation Act* and as enabled through the powers listed in Section 28, including adjudication of project applications and allocation of funds for community heritage projects, communications and promotion, advocacy and special initiatives. Specific responsibilities are assigned to the various committees of the Board (see below).

The Trust must pay any money received by it into the British Columbia Heritage Trust Fund and establish and maintain an accounting system satisfactory to the Minister of Finance. The Trust must annually submit to the Minister a report of the Heritage Trust and its operations for the preceding fiscal year, a financial statement showing assets and liabilities and an auditor's report.

The Executive Officer and the Manager of Heritage Programs have the delegated authority to approve individual administrative and other operating expenses, including contracts, to a maximum of \$25,000 and \$10,000 respectively.

Trust directors are subject to the Provincial government's standards of conduct and conflict of interest guidelines.

### ***5.2 Board Committees and Their Functions***

The Board's Standing Committees are the following:

*Executive Committee:* To act on behalf of the Board to make decisions on critical items between Board meetings, address policy, organizational and personnel matters, assign tasks to committees and represent the Board through communications with the Government of British Columbia.

*Finance Committee:* To present the annual budget submission to the Board, to monitor the Trust financial system, to report to the Board on the financial status of the Trust and to guide the annual audit review process.

*Initiatives Committee:* To undertake necessary research and analysis and provide advice to the Board on new policy, program or project initiatives; to develop new partnerships and revenue initiatives; and provide advice on policy issues referred to the Trust by the Minister, including opportunities for presentation of British Columbia's history through Provincial heritage properties.

*Communications Committee:* To guide the Trust's communications and promotions efforts and provide effective liaison with client organizations at the community level to ensure awareness of and support for the Trust programs and initiatives and to facilitate recognition of community heritage activity.

*Websites Technology Committee:* To provide a focus for the Trust's efforts to utilize emerging computer-based technology to enhance the recording, management and interpretation of heritage-related information and to improve dissemination of public information on Trust programs and activities.

*Project Adjudication Committee:* To review and approve completed project applications seeking financial support under existing Community Heritage Investment Programs and to commit funds of the Trust to assist these projects within the overall approved Investment Programs budget.

Although the Trust has no direct staff, personnel of the Heritage Branch provided core support services. Services provided to the Board by the Heritage Branch include: administrative support, research and policy development, management, program administration, communications and promotion, financial services and general administration. Wayne Carter, Branch Director, serves as the Executive Officer to the Trust. Other key personnel include Patrick Frey, Manager of Heritage Programs, and Penny Warholm, Manager of Administration.

## 7. Supplementary Information

### 7.1 Trust Goals

The Heritage Trust's primary goals are to:

- Support heritage planning, conservation and interpretation in all British Columbia communities.
- Inform the public about the value of heritage, influence public attitudes to support heritage conservation and scholarship and encourage celebration of heritage.
- Provide advice to the Minister on matters pertaining to conservation of British Columbia's heritage.

These goals are consistent with the goals of the Ministry and the Government of British Columbia for the period 2000/2001. Specifically, the Trust's support of heritage conservation in partnership with British Columbia communities contributes to the goal of a greener economy, in which heritage tourism plays an important role, and the goal of community strength and diversity.

The Trust's business areas, goals and objectives are further elaborated in the 2001-2004 Performance Plan.

## **7.2 Performance Indicators**

The Trust's Performance Plan also establishes output and outcome performance indicators for each goal. For some of these, data are already available and are reported here.

In future the Trust will report annually to the Minister on all performance measures and indicators of success. In 2001/2002, a few key measures will be used. In subsequent years, additional measures will be added and others refined to enable more comprehensive analysis of the effectiveness of Provincial investment in the Trust and other heritage-related programs.

The following tables detail information about proposals received and projects approved by the BC Heritage Trust in Fiscal Year 2000/2001.

The information is tabulated by funding program and geographic region, and provides baseline data for the Trust's Performance Report. For the purpose of this analysis, only project-specific funding has been included in the calculations.

Funding under the Trust's Human Resource Development Programs (Education & Professional Development, Training & Volunteer Development, and Provincial Heritage Organizations) has not been included.

### ***1. Ratio of projects approved to proposals received:***

The Trust provided support to 55% (66 of 120) of all project proposals received.

### ***2. Ratio of funds invested to funds requested:***

The Trust's support to the 66 approved projects comprised 62% of the amount requested by these applicants.

### ***3. Ratio of value added to Trust investment:***

The Trust's support to the 66 approved projects comprised 15% of the total estimated value of these projects. Put another way, each dollar invested in projects by the Trust in 2000/2001 attracted another \$5.65 in support from other sources.
