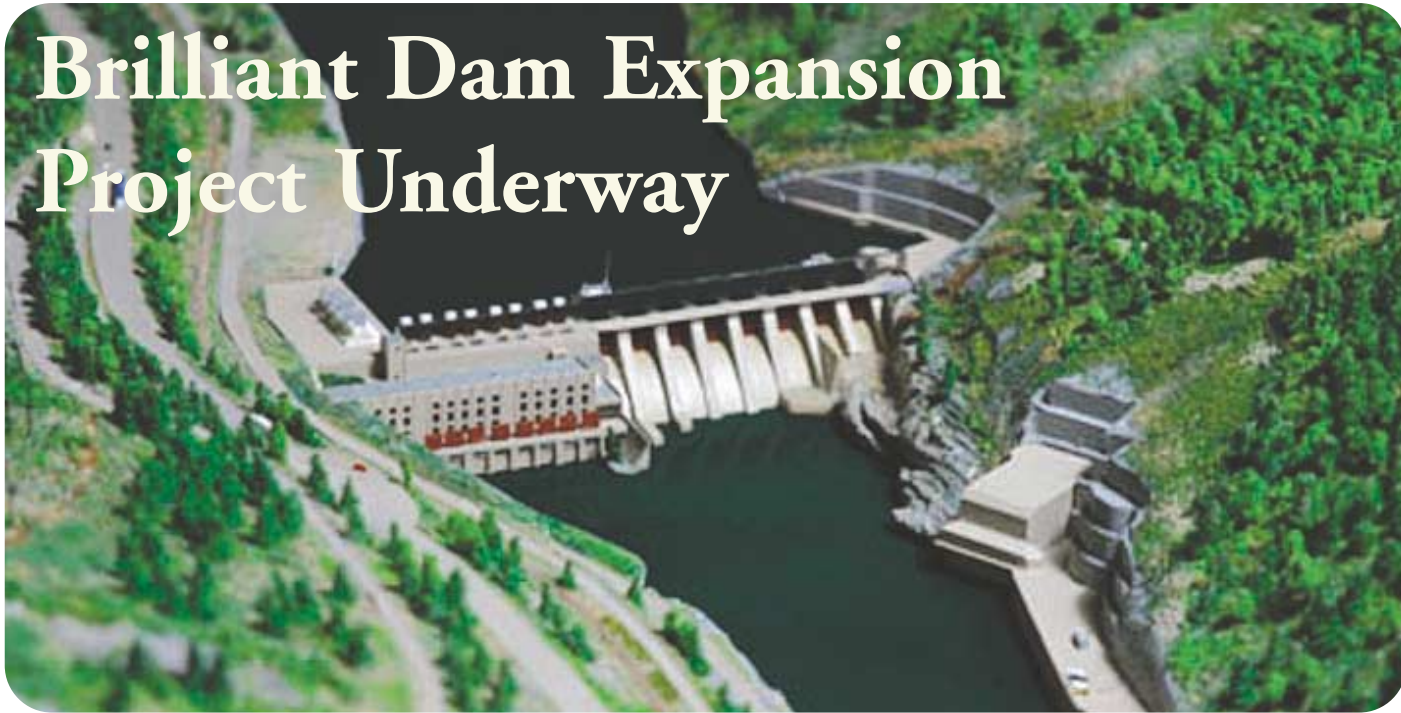

Brilliant Dam Expansion Project Underway



An expansion of the Brilliant power plant, owned by the Columbia Basin Trust (CBT) and Columbia Power Corporation (CPC), kicked into gear earlier this year.

Premier Gordon Campbell, MLA Sandy Santori, and CBT Board Chair Josh Smienk officially unveiled the \$204-million project in April. The power expansion provides an average of 150 on-site jobs and increases B.C.'s supply of renewable energy.

"Many people have put a lot of time and energy into making this project viable," said Smienk. "We are thankful for their dedication and commitment and are pleased this project is now underway. It will provide numerous long-term benefits for social, economic and environmental projects for communities in the Columbia Basin."

The Brilliant Expansion Project is part of the Columbia Basin Trust's investment portfolio. Columbia Basin Trust receives 50 per cent of the revenue from its partnership with Columbia Power Corporation in the Brilliant Dam and Arrow Lakes Generating Station.

In February 2003, a design-build

agreement was signed with the Brilliant Expansion Consortium of Skanska-Chant JV and SNC-Lavalin Inc. to complete the Brilliant power expansion. Skanska-Chant JV is a joint venture of Skanska International Civil Engineering AB and Chant Construction Ltd. The expansion project, involving the construction of a powerhouse off the east side of the Brilliant Dam, utilizes excess water through the spillways.

The benefits of additional generation at Brilliant Dam are avoidance of greenhouse gas emissions of approximately 450,000 tonnes of carbon

dioxide per year and improvement of downstream aquatic habitat by reducing total gas pressure caused by water spilling over the dam.

- ♦ Located eight kilometres from Castlegar
- ♦ Produces an additional 120 megawatts of power
- ♦ Completion of the project is scheduled for 2006

More than funding

CBT also invests, produces energy, and provides services

Columbia Basin Trust may be best known for the more than \$4 million in funding it annually provides to community-supported projects in the Basin.

But CBT is more than a funding or granting organization. It also invests in power and “non-power” ventures to create income for its funding and service programs. There is also a growing focus on helping communities build capacity and on educating residents about water issues in the Basin.

Between 1995 and 2005, CBT will have invested

more than \$500 million in power projects in the Basin through its subsidiary CBT Energy Inc. and joint venture partnership with Columbia Power Corporation (CPC). The partners completed the first power project - the Arrow Lakes Generating Station - near Castlegar in 2003. Construction on the Brilliant Expansion Project started in April 2003 and is scheduled for completion in 2006.

In 1995, the Province of BC provided \$45 million to the CBT, which was invested in business loans, income securities, real estate and venture capital and has now grown to \$52.1 million. (See page 4 for CBT's investments).

In 2003, CBT strengthened its commitment to

support the values and views of Basin residents by releasing a Water Initiatives Strategy. The CBT wants to involve Basin residents in building a network of organizations to address water issues. It is committed to educating residents about water issues in the Basin so they can fully participate in future water related processes. (See page 6 for CBT's Water Strategy).

For CBT, capacity building means working with communities, rather than having a set of pre-determined outcomes that CBT wishes communities to achieve. It is supporting communities to work together in undertaking their own challenges so communities are able to increase their sense of self-reliance and ability to address their own problems and challenges.

The Nature Trust of British Columbia and its five participating partners, Ducks Unlimited Canada, Columbia Basin Trust, Castlegar Friends of Parks and Trails Society, West Kootenay Naturalists, and Columbia Basin Fish and Wildlife Compensation Program, purchased Waldie Island in Castlegar for its important wildlife values.

“The Waldie Island acquisition is for many of us a dream come true,” says Walter Volovsek, Director of the Castlegar Friends of Parks and Trails Society.

Waldie Island is a small, undisturbed two-acre island in the Columbia River. Cottonwood, lodgepole pine and riparian shrubs cover the island. The forest and wetland area provides habitat for the blue-listed Great Blue Heron and a variety of other bird species.

“Columbia Basin Trust is excited to be involved in this initiative,” says Kindy Gosal, CBT Manager of Water Initiatives. “Locally supported, multi-partner land conservation initiatives like this project help provide legacies for Basin communities.”

Supporting literacy in the Basin

Columbia Basin Trust (CBT) is honoured by an award recognizing it as a “literacy friendly organization” by the Columbia Basin Alliance for Literacy (CBAL), a non-profit organization that promotes literacy and lifelong learning throughout the Columbia Basin.

The Columbia Basin Trust has provided \$540,000 in funding to CBAL over the past three years through CBT's Resources for Family Literacy program.

The award was presented at CBT's annual general meeting in Castlegar on July 18.

Community broadband projects receive funding development

On behalf of rural Columbia Basin communities, the Columbia Mountain Open Network (CMON) received funding to develop business plans for the following four community broadband projects:

- Golden and Columbia Shuswap Regional District Area A
- Nakusp and Regional District of Central Kootenay Area K
- Kootenay Lake
- Regional District of Central Kootenay Areas I and J

The community broadband business plans will be developed with

funding from part of Industry Canada's \$105-million 'Broadband for Rural and Northern Development' (BRAND) Pilot Program. The BRAND program is delivered through two rounds of business plan development funding, followed by two rounds of implementation funding.

The current four Columbia Basin projects are in the second round of the BRAND funding program. Matching funds for these projects are provided by the Columbia Basin Trust's Community Broadband Planning Program.

"Receiving these grants is an

important step in the development of sustainable community networks in the Columbia Basin," said Jeff Roberts CMON's Chief Executive Officer. "This result could not have been achieved without the hard work and support of a large number of community groups and the Columbia Basin Trust."

The total amount of funding announced in this second round of the BRAND Pilot Program is \$1,768,777.

Basin, Legacy funds provide future income

The Columbia Basin Trust, in conjunction with Watson Wyatt Worldwide, prepared a framework earlier this year for the management of CBT's assets.

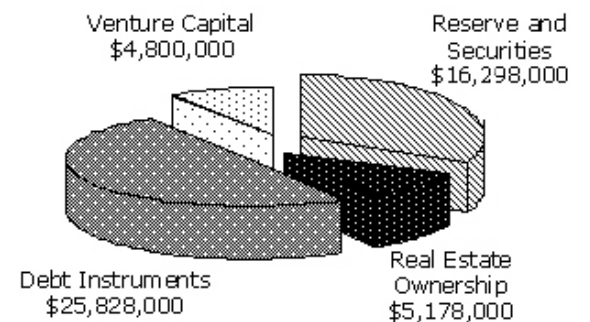
This policy led to the creation of the Basin and Legacy Funds. The policy sets out authorities, procedures, risk tolerance and performance goals. It's also designed to assist CBT in monitoring and evaluating the investment performance of the assets of the Basin and Legacy Funds.

The **BASIN FUND** is the vehicle for investing CBT's non-power capital in the Basin. The objective is to maximize the expected rate of return on CBT's assets, while preserving the real value of the capital over the long-term with an acceptable degree of risk. A secondary objective is to enhance the economic self-sufficiency of the Basin by strengthening and diversifying the regional economy, while maintaining the real value of the capital over the long-term. Investments in this fund are exposed to the risk of capital loss, particularly over the short-term.

The *Basin Fund* was initially funded through a \$45 million payment from the Province of BC on April 1, 1996. Future money allocated to the *Basin Fund* will come from income generated by CBT's investments.

The **LEGACY FUND** investment capital came from the Province of BC and is intended as low risk investments. Ensuring capital remains in place for future generations drives the Legacy Fund.

The investment objective of the *Legacy Fund* is to maximize the expected return of the assets, while preserving the real value of the legacy capital with a relatively high degree of certainty. Subject to maintaining the real value of the capital, the objective of the *Legacy Fund* is to generate income to fund the Basin Fund and the delivery of benefits.

The *Legacy Fund* currently consists of CBT's interest in the Arrow Lakes Generating Station and the Brilliant Dam power projects.

Protecting one of the most at-risk species

Since 2001, CBT has provided \$62,000 to help in the recovery of the Northern Leopard Frog through environment funding.

Frogs are mysteriously declining around the globe, and populations in British Columbia are no exception. Since the 1970s, the Northern Leopard frog, one of North America's most common frog, has virtually disappeared in Western North America.

In B.C., it was common to see leopard frogs throughout the East and Central Kootenays and in the Southern Okanagan. However since their mysterious decline this species is only found in a single wetland in the protected Creston Valley Wildlife Management Area (CVWMA). This population is listed as endangered and protected under the new Species At Risk Act.

Although it is hard to estimate the numbers of frogs in the CVWMA, biologists have confirmed no more than six breeding pairs.

While factors such as habitat loss, pesticides, UV-B, global warming and the introduction of fish species (which prey on tadpoles) all likely contribute to their decline, biologists in Creston have found another cause, a newly discovered disease caused by Chytrid fungus.

Numerous leopard frogs have been found dead and dying from the fungus, which is also responsible for the

decline and extinction of frogs in other parts of the world including Panama and Australia. As a result, Northern

Leopard frogs in B.C. are highly susceptible to extirpation and unlikely to recover without assistance.

In an effort to keep Northern Leopard frogs from completely disappearing from B.C., biologists have designed a facility in Creston to rear tadpoles in a safe environment free of disease and predators as a part of a multi-agency recovery program. Since 2001, the program has successfully reared and released more than 5,000 juvenile frogs and several thousand tadpoles in the CVWMA.

On August 7, biologists released approximately 1,500 juvenile frogs in the Bummer's Flats Conservation Area between Wasa and Fort Steele, a site where Northern Leopard frogs used to occur. These are the first leopard frogs to inhabit the East Kootenay in over 20 years, a major turning point in the recovery of this species in British Columbia.

Partners in the Northern Leopard frog recovery project include the Columbia Basin Fish and Wildlife Compensation Program, CVWMA, Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection (MWLAP), World Wildlife Fund, Environment Canada and Columbia Basin Trust. The Bummer's Flats Conservation Area is managed by Ducks Unlimited Canada and MWLAP for its fish and wildlife values.

Monitoring and evaluating key to learning, accountability

CBT is a learning organization that places a high priority on monitoring and evaluating its activities and operations. CBT launched a monitoring and evaluation process this past year to assist us in being a learning and accountable organization. Monitoring and evaluation provides information to support decision-making by:

1. Evaluating how CBT works (consistency with its principles) and what CBT achieves by:
 - (a) clearly stating in writing what CBT intends to achieve prior to undertaking an activity;
 - (b) collecting accurate and evidence-based information (qualitative and quantitative) needed to evaluate results objectively; and
 - (c) providing recommendations for changes based on the outcomes of the evaluation.
2. Monitoring changes in social, environmental and economic Basin well-being.

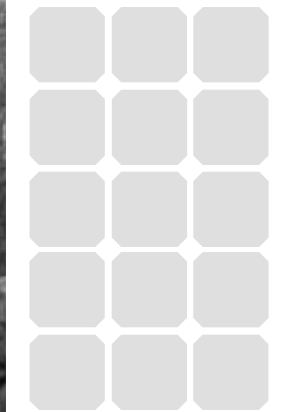

Connecting Cultures

Camp provides opportunities for Ktunaxa families to rediscover roots

Staying in teepees, visiting pictographs, hiking some of the Spirit Trail, visiting the Top of the World park chert quarries, canoeing, and visits by Elders are only part of what Ktunaxa youth and families are rediscovering about their culture through the Akisqnuq Rediscovery Camp.

The 10-day camps, held at the Cave Creek Campground at Whiteswan Lake, offer cultural and recreation programs, training and activities that address the challenges facing youth Ktunaxa families.

“The camp is unique because Whiteswan Lake is a spiritual place, steeped in history and legend and has a great deal of meaning to the Ktunaxa people,” says Robert Firth, Camp Director and visionary behind the idea.

Whiteswan Lake, which is located within the Kootenay Ranges of the Rocky Mountains, was an important seasonal hunting camp of the Ktunaxa people. Their use of the area dates back at least 5,000 years. There is a Ktunaxa legend that young men would go to Cave Creek on a vision quest.

“According to Elders, there is a ledge under the lake and a small cave that the young men would go to on their vision quest,” says Firth. “Being at this camp, you can feel that it is a special place. You can understand why they would come to this place.”

During the 10-day stays, campers participate in crafts, traditional games from many different tribes and nations, and hiking to pictographs and chert quarries. Chert is a type of glass-like rock that is made into sharp tools that have been found in large parts of North America through trade with other tribes.

Elders and traditional use workers from Ktunaxa/ Kinbasket Treaty Council come to the camp and explain the history of the area, and to teach the campers about traditional values of land use and culture.

“One Elder tells the campers a legend of a battle that took place on that ground between the Blackfoot Tribe and the Ktunaxa.”

Just before sunset the campers participate in ‘spirit time.’

“Each person is encouraged to find a special place that feels good to them. They take one hour just for themselves in solitude to reflect on where they are, physically and emotionally and to connect with the place. Then they come back to the circle fire and they are encouraged to speak about anything on their mind in a non-threatening and very supportive way,” says Firth.

The first camp held this summer was a boys-only. The boys play games, mostly with sticks and stones.

“My favourite part of the camp

was spirit time. I got to learn about myself and how the day went. I also like swimming, cliff jumping and sleeping in teepees,” says Eli Puskaric, 12, of the Columbia Lake Band.

A girls-only camp started August 5. The goal of the girls-only camp is for them to learn about rites of passage and their place in society now and historically by elders. They also do all of the activities the boys do.



In late fall, family camps are held.

“We really want families to come and connect back with their culture and history and have this experience together,” says Firth.

The Akisqnuq Rediscovery Camp has five junior guides and two senior guides who mentor the younger guides. They are



trained in canoe safety and rescue, bear awareness, first aid and wilderness survival. Many of the senior guides have professional training from other camps and have brought that experience back and shared it with the junior guides.

The camp is in its first year of what the organizers hope to be an annual experience.

“The vision was shared by many people, and could not have become real without the support of many people; we are not reinventing the wheel but rediscovering what was already there,” says Firth, the Community Healing Coordinator for Columbia Lake Band, who spent many hours getting the camp ready, from clearing wind-falls, to organizing gear and securing funding and setting up the site. “All of the comments have been really favourable so

far, so we really hope we can continue this next year.”

Columbia Basin Trust provided \$37,776 through the Families Program and \$10,000 through the Basin Youth in Communities program.

“The work is absolutely worth it everyday,” says Firth. “I didn’t anticipate the connection with the site that would come with the camp. I knew that there would be some connection, but not this strong. As you go to sleep at night and hear the sounds of owls, loons, eagles, and see the fish, there is a strong sense of connection to this very special place.”

Akisqnuq means people between two lakes (Columbia and Windermere Lakes). It is also the name of the Columbia Lake Band.
