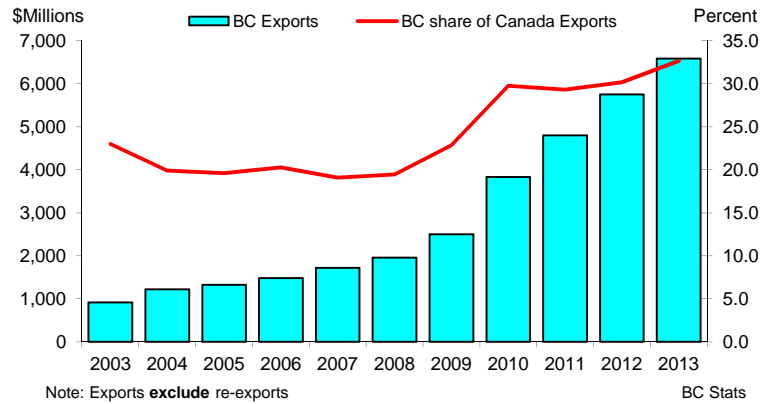

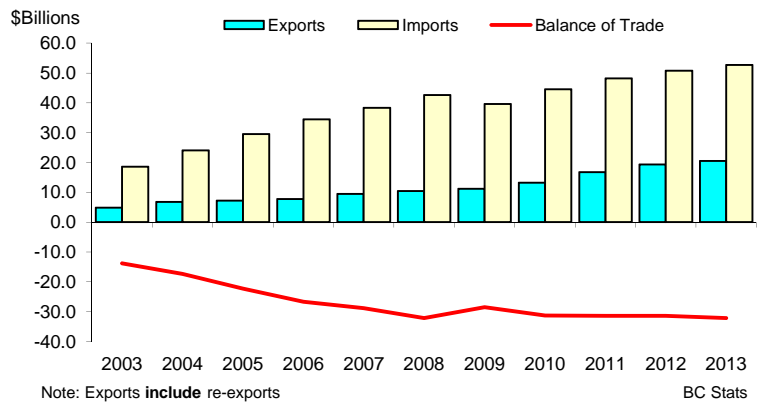
BC Origin Exports to Mainland China

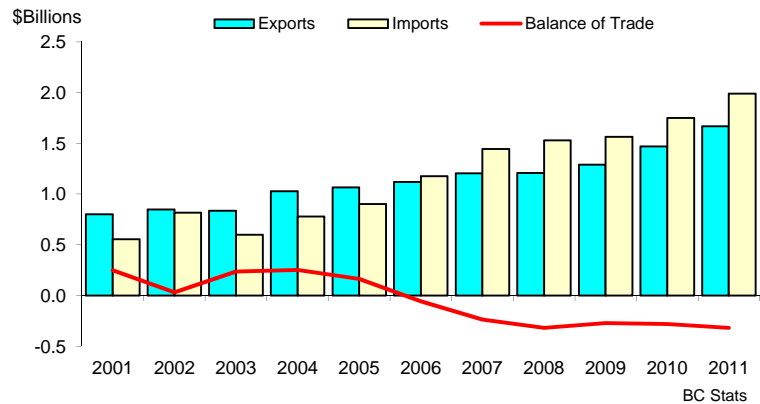
Canada's Balance of Trade in Goods with Mainland China

How important is Mainland China to BC and Canada?

Mainland China ranked #2 as a destination for BC origin exports in 2013 with 19.6% of BC's commodity exports shipped there. It was ranked #2 as a destination for Canadian exports with 4.6% of Canadian goods exports shipped there and #2 as a source of imports into Canada with 11.1% of Canadian imports originating from Mainland China.

How important is Canada to Mainland China?

Canada was the source of approximately 0.7% of imports into Mainland China in 2012. Approximately 2.1% of exports from Mainland China were destined for Canada in that year.

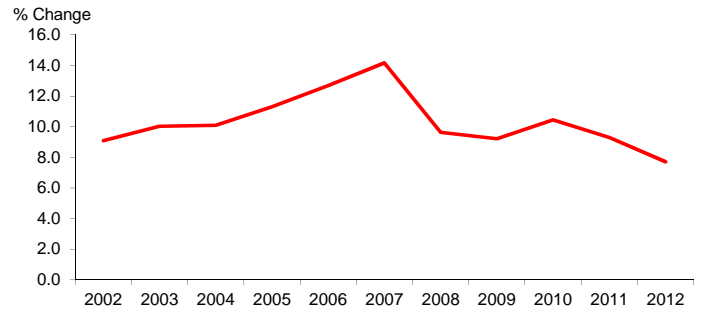

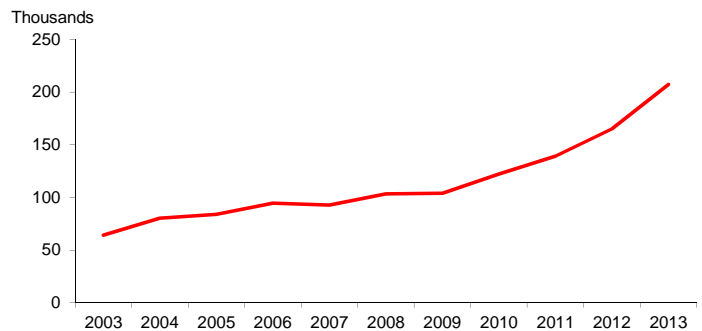
Immigrants to BC from Mainland China
