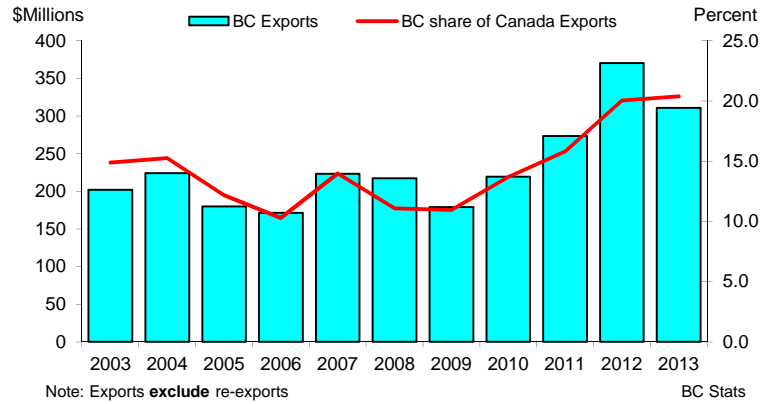

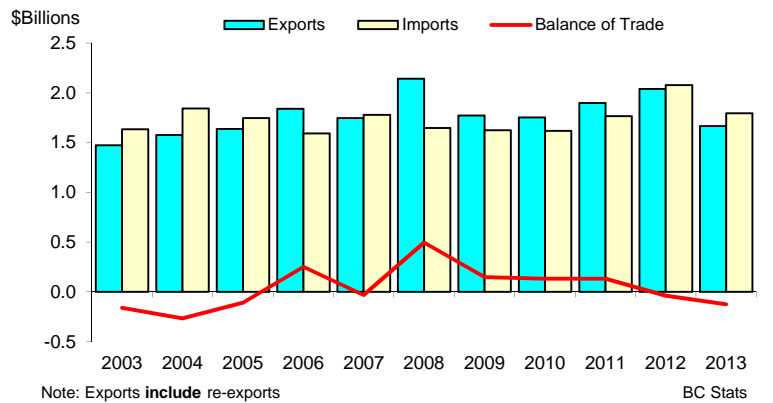

### How important is Australia to BC and Canada?

Australia ranked #8 as a destination for BC origin exports in 2013 with 0.9% of BC's commodity exports shipped there. It was ranked #18 as a destination for Canadian exports with 0.3% of Canadian goods exports shipped there and #28 as a source of imports into Canada with 0.4% of Canadian imports originating from Australia.

### How important is Canada to Australia?

Canada was the source of approximately 0.6% of imports into Australia in 2012. Approximately 0.6% of exports from Australia were destined for Canada in that year.

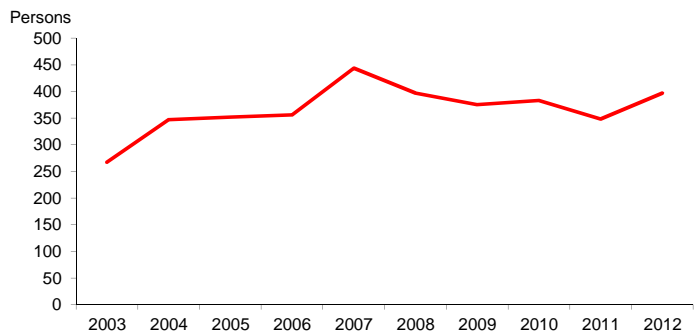
### Year-Over-Year % Growth in GDP of Australia

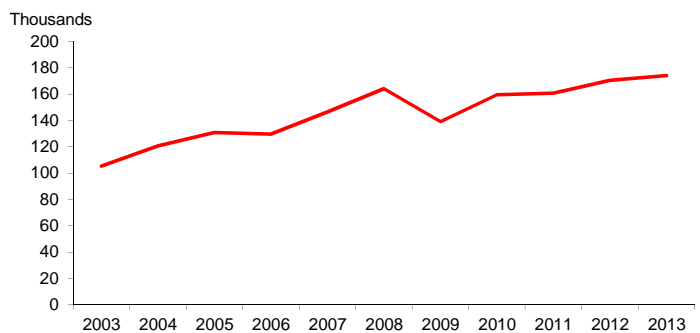
### Immigrants to BC from Australia
