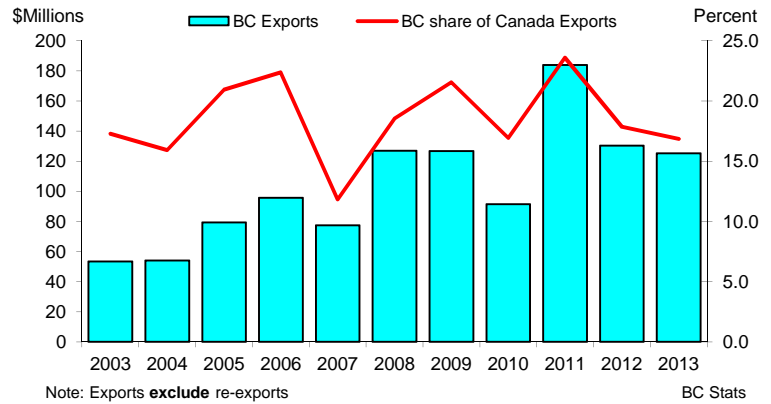

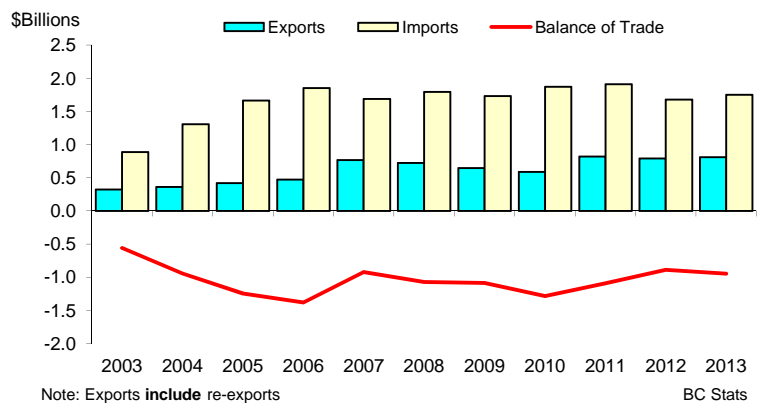
## BC Origin Exports to Chile

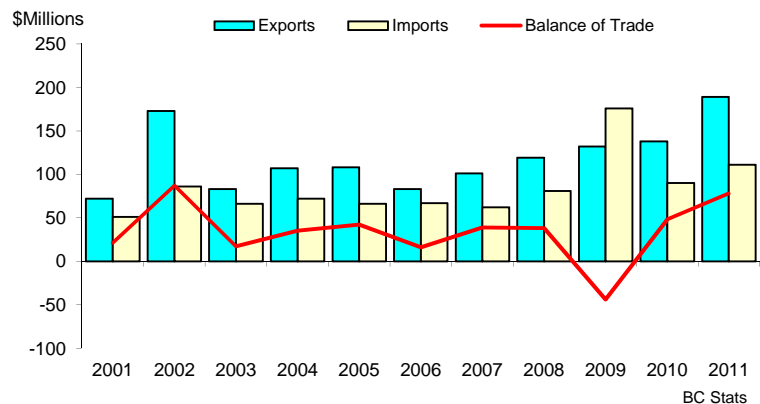
## Canada's Balance of Trade in Goods with Chile

### How important is Chile to BC and Canada?

Chile ranked #16 as a destination for BC origin exports in 2013 with 0.4% of BC's commodity exports shipped there. It was ranked #27 as a destination for Canadian exports with 0.2% of Canadian goods exports shipped there and #29 as a source of imports into Canada with 0.4% of Canadian imports originating from Chile.

### How important is Canada to Chile?

Canada was the source of approximately 0.7% of imports into Chile in 2012. Approximately 2.3% of exports from Chile were destined for Canada in that year.

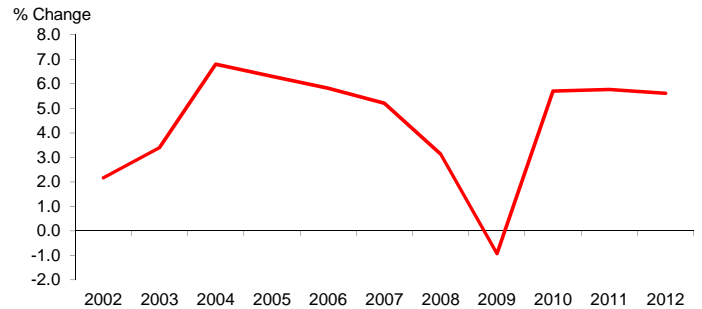

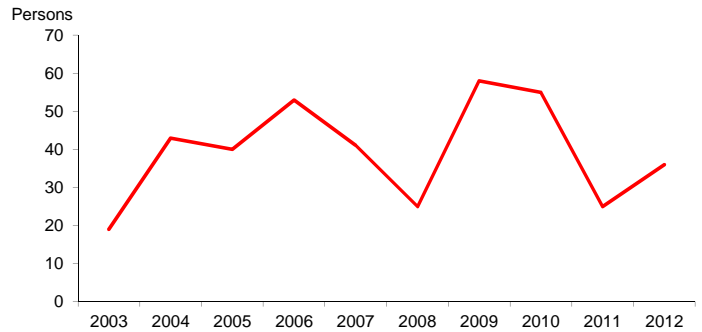
### Year-Over-Year % Growth in GDP of Chile

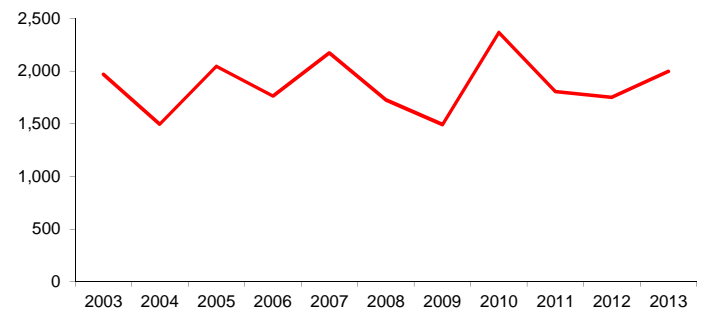
### Immigrants to BC from Chile
