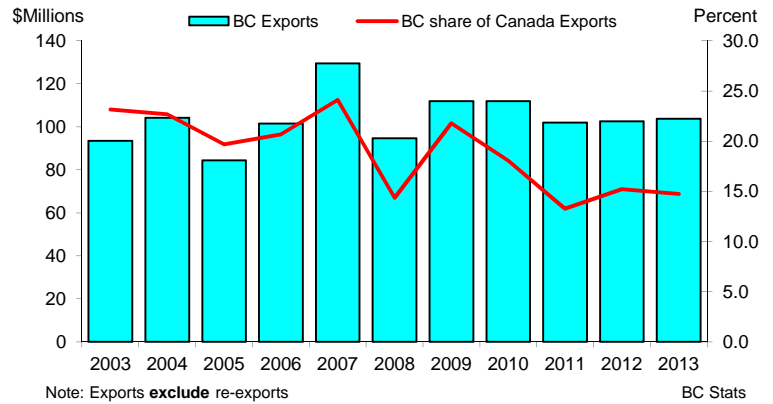

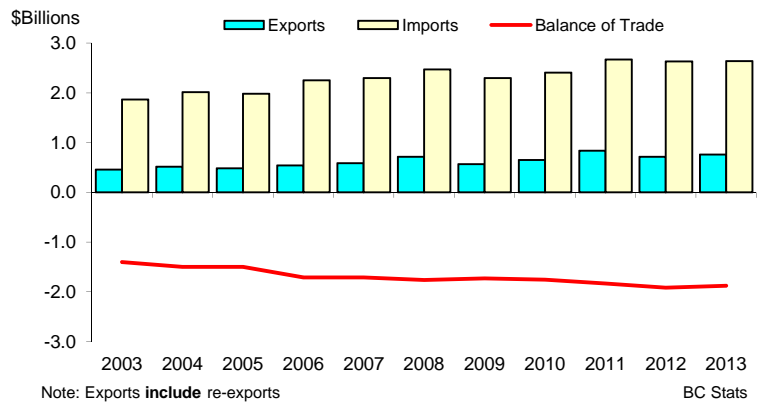
## BC Origin Exports to Thailand

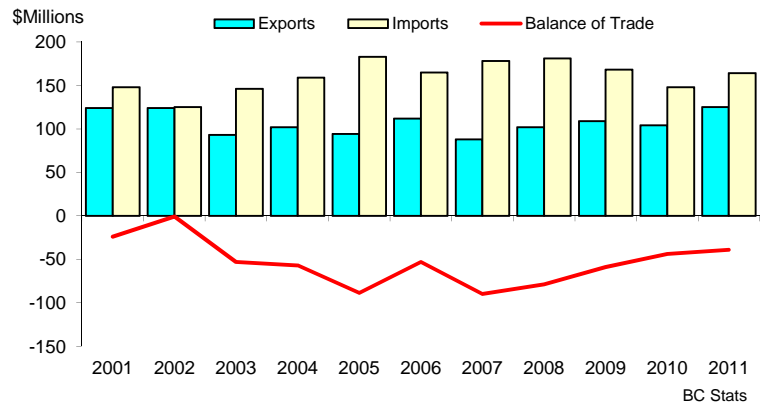
## Canada's Balance of Trade in Goods with Thailand

### How important is Thailand to BC and Canada?

Thailand ranked #20 as a destination for BC origin exports in 2013 with 0.3% of BC's commodity exports shipped there. It was ranked #29 as a destination for Canadian exports with 0.2% of Canadian goods exports shipped there and #21 as a source of imports into Canada with 0.6% of Canadian imports originating from Thailand.

### How important is Canada to Thailand?

Canada was the source of approximately 0.2% of imports into Thailand in 2012. Approximately 1.0% of exports from Thailand were destined for Canada in that year.

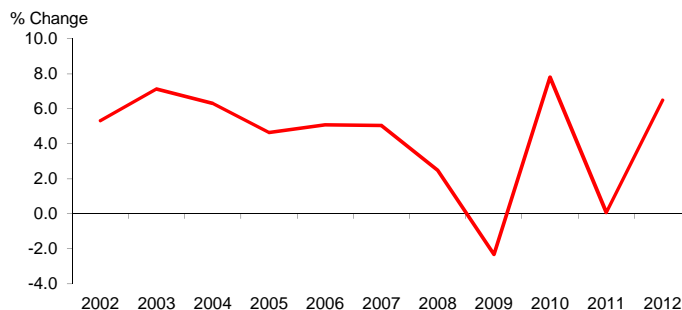

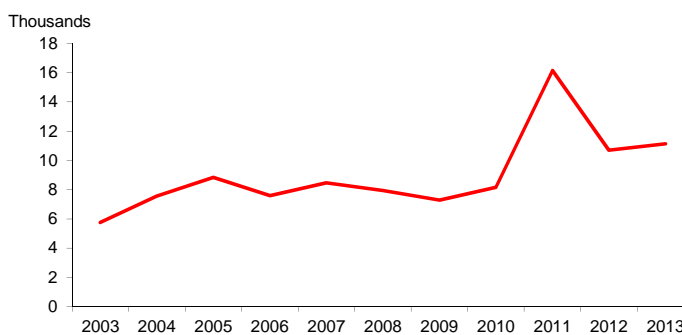
### Immigrants to BC from Thailand
