

Profile of B.C.'s Construction Sector

What is the magnitude of the construction sector?

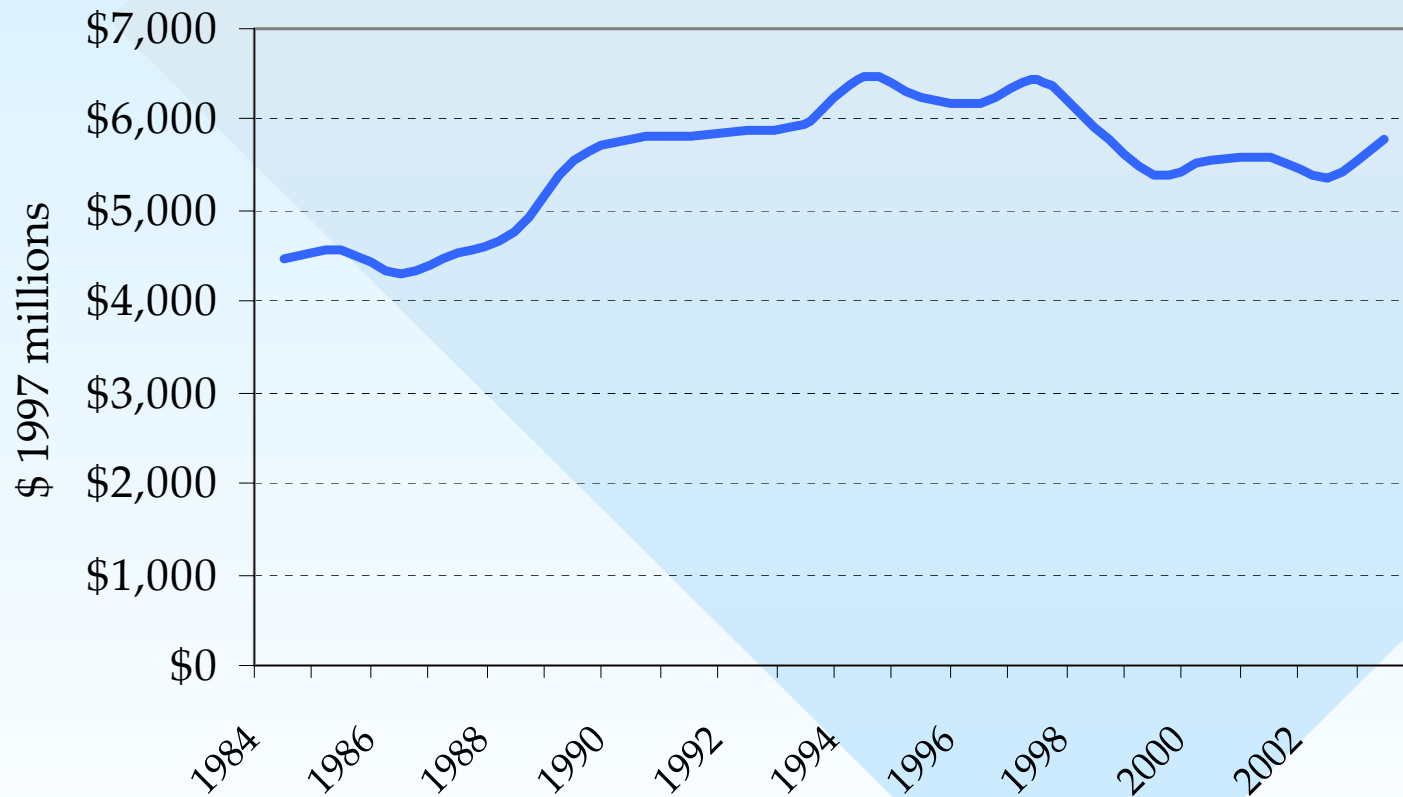
- In 2003, the value of building permits in B.C. was \$6.39 billion.
- This shows strong growth over 2002 levels (13% increase), coming back up to the peak in activity in 1996.
- Most of the gains were in residential construction and repair.

How many businesses are there in the construction sector?

- In 2003, there were 43,846 establishments in the construction sector in B.C.,
- Of the businesses with employees:
 - 15,665 had 1-19 employees
 - 1,086 had 20-49 employees
 - 455 had 50 or more employees
- 26,640 firms in this sector had no employees (i.e. were self-employed or had no employees on payroll).

How much economic activity does the construction sector generate?

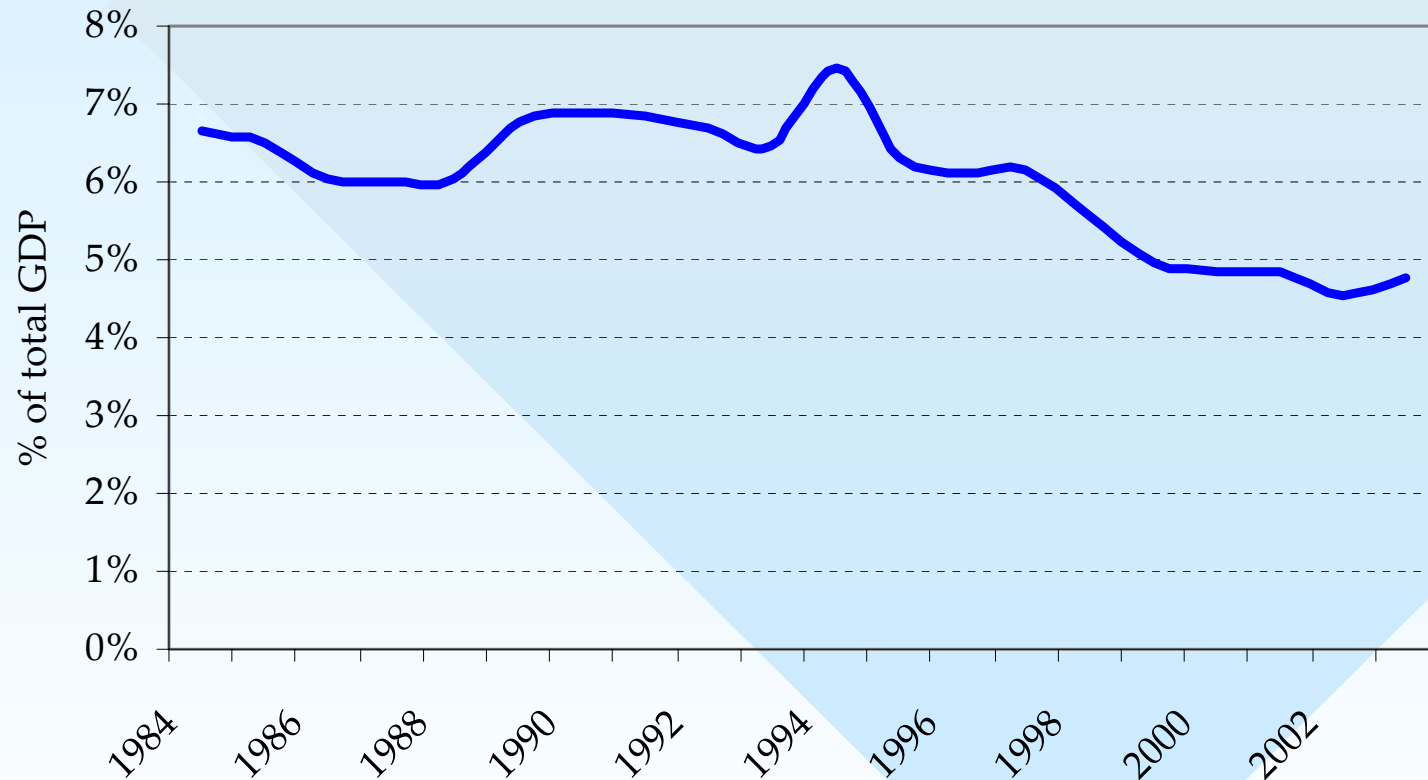
British Columbia Construction GDP (\$1997)

Construction GDP as a percent of Total GDP



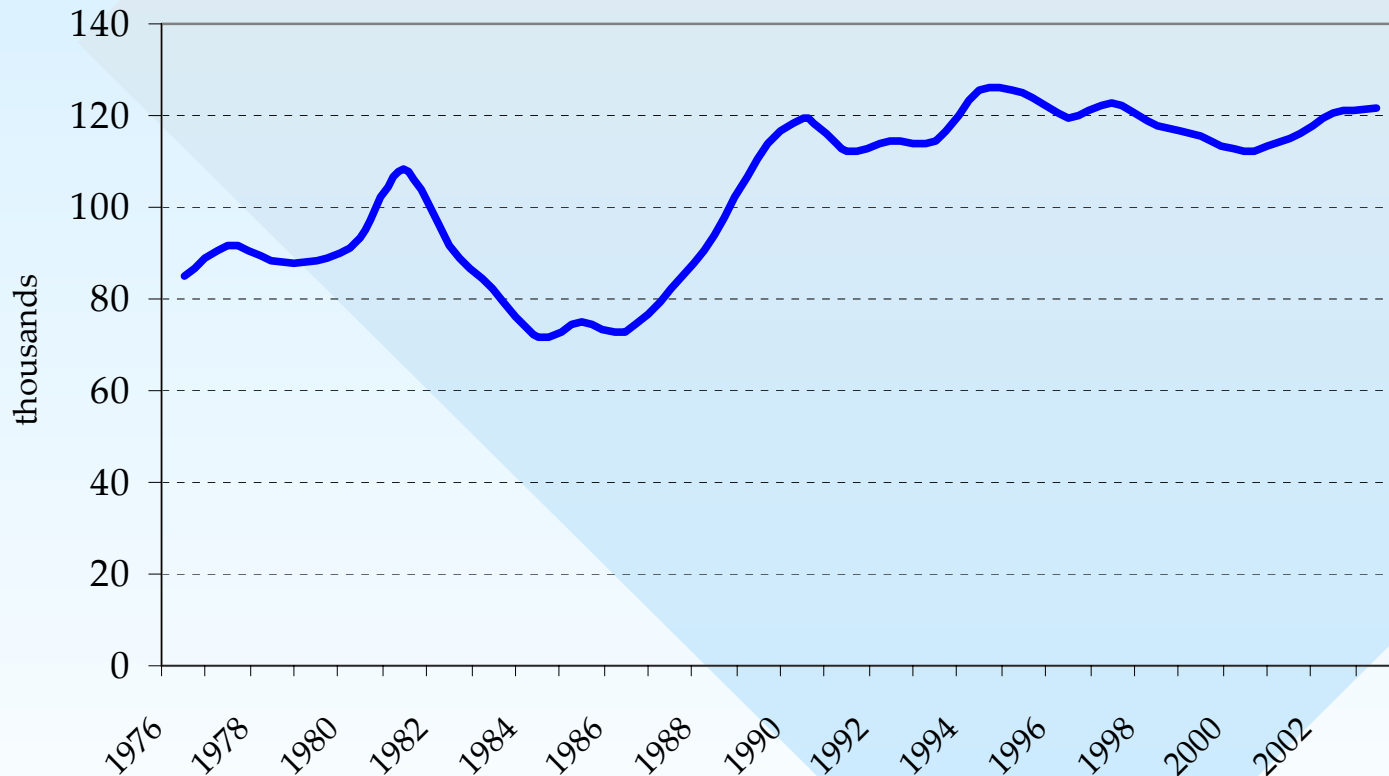

Where in the province is construction happening?

- Most construction activity is happening in the Lower Mainland.
 - 65% of the building permits (value) are within the Mainland/Southwest.
- Outside of the Lower Mainland, 2003 saw gains in:
 - Capital region
 - Comox-Courtenay, Cowichan Valley and Nanaimo areas
 - Kamloops
 - All areas of the Okanagan valley
 - Nelson, Creston, Fernie and Trail
 - Prince George

Employment in B.C.'s Construction sector

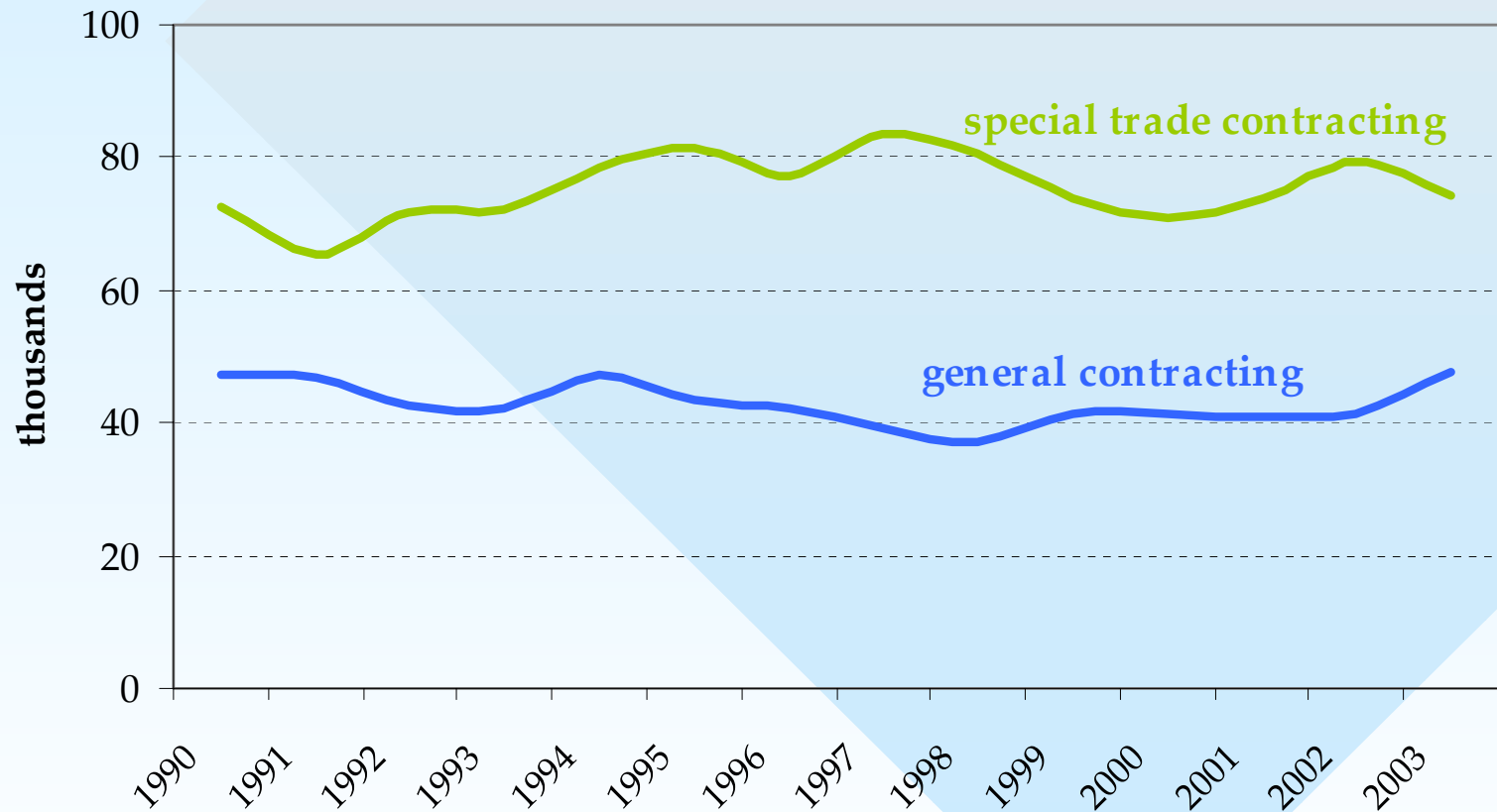

What types of activities do workers in the construction sector do?

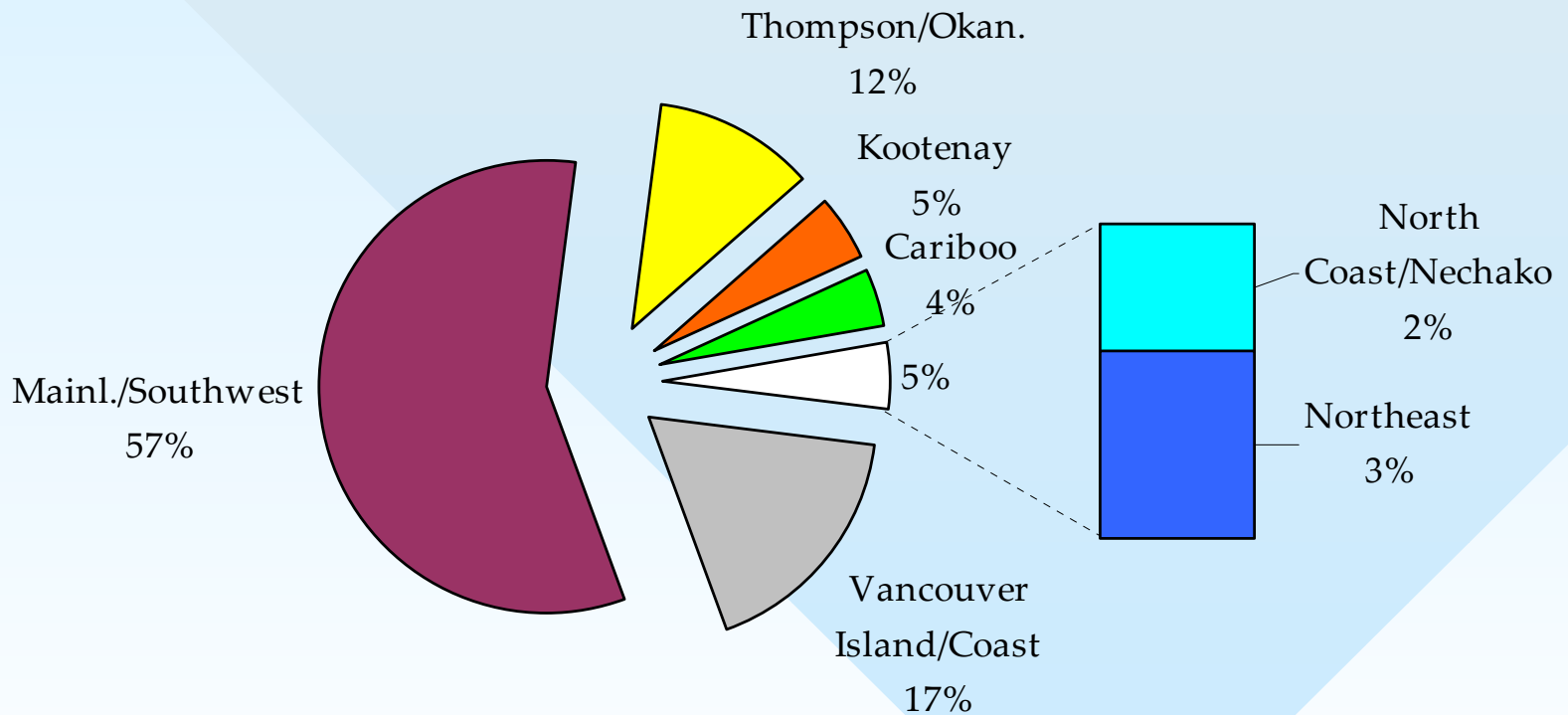
Construction Employment by Activity

Regional distribution of construction jobs

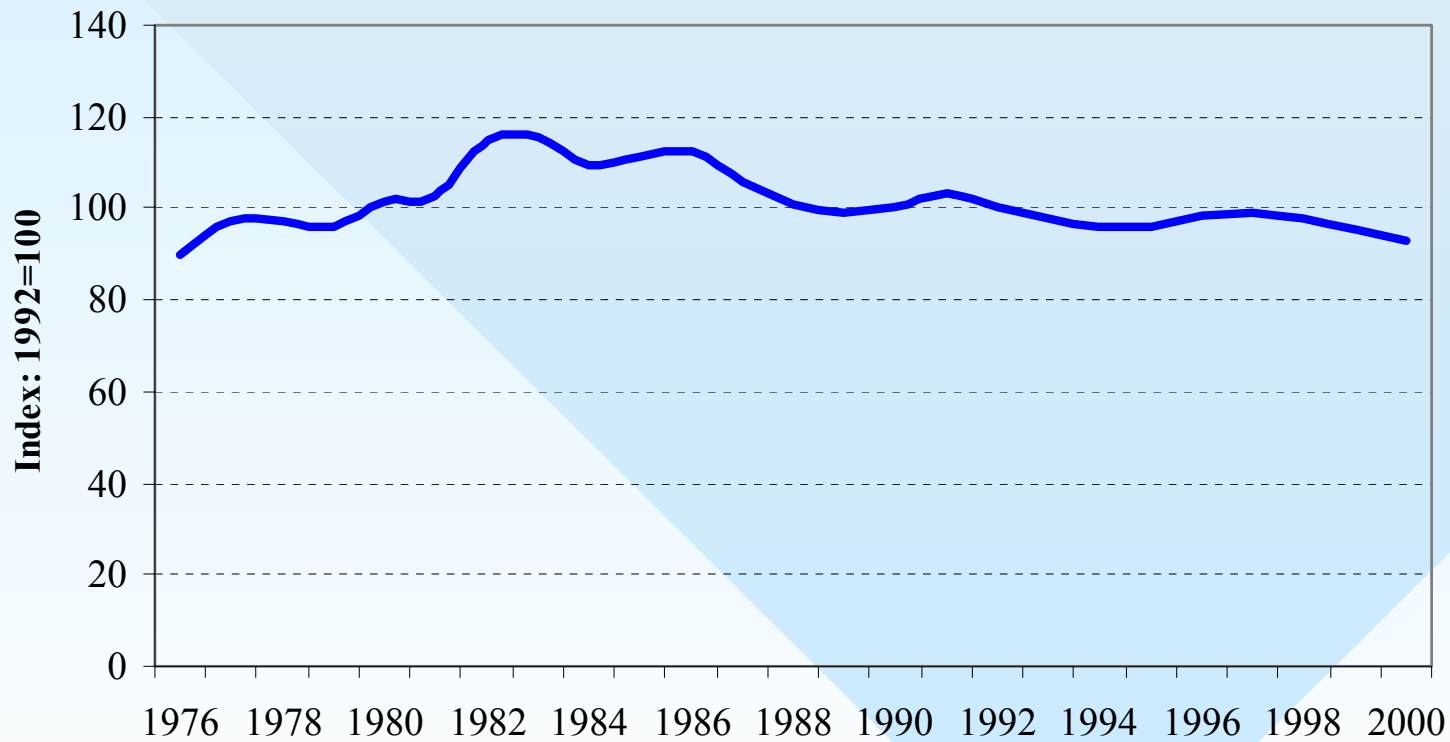
Regional Distribution of Construction Employment, 2003

Current climate in the construction sector

- Construction has begun to rebound in B.C. in the last 2-3 years.
- Residential construction and renovations still account for much of the increase in building permit activity, although large engineered projects are in the planning stages
- Continued low interest rates have fueled much of the renewed investment by homeowners.
- Benefits are being seen outside the GVRD area, particularly Vancouver Island and the Okanagan.

Emerging opportunities

- Private sector economists are predicting continued low interest rates which will help sustain construction activity.
- The 2010 Winter Olympics will result in a number of engineered projects, commercial building, and some infrastructure developments.
- A significant number of other commercial and industrial developments are currently in planning phases.
- Federal & provincial govts. have announced plans for a number of highway infrastructure projects.
